Dr. Diane Afoumado of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum presents the dramatic story of MS *St. Louis* through archival documents, photographs and artifacts.

Presenter: Dr. Diane F. Afoumado is Chief of the Research and Reference Branch, Holocaust Survivors and Victims Resource Center at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C. A former Assistant Professor of Contemporary History at the University Paris Nanterre and the Institut national des langues et civilisations orientales (INALCO) in Paris, she also worked for the two French commissions related to compensation for Jewish victims. In addition, she was a Historian for the Archival Division of the Centre de documentation juive contemporaine – Mémorial de la Shoah.

The short film will be followed by a talk on "The Enduring Importance of Eyewitness Accounts" by Professor Jennifer Evans and a Q&A session with Mr. Moskovic and Professor Evans.

Biographies

David Moskovic was born in 1929 in Koňuš, Czechoslovakia. At the age of 15, he was transported to Auschwitz with his entire family. David survived both Bunalager (Buna) slave labour camp (Auschwitz III) and Buchenwald concentration camp. His personal testimony as a Holocaust survivor reflects his resilience under unimaginable circumstances. He immigrated to Canada following the war, and lives in Ottawa.

Guest Speaker Jennifer Evans is a Professor of History at Carleton University, where she teaches German and European history, including the politics of authoritarianism, populism and fascism.

The Canadian War Museum has cooperated with the Centre for Holocaust Education and Scholarship (CHES) on this public programming, associated with the exhibition **St. Louis – Ship of Fate**.
